Back in November, my friend John, and I went to the Classic Motor Show in Birmingham, UK, as well as a number of other places the week before the show.

The trip started out with a visit to the Imperial War Museum in Duxford, which is a WWI airfield that displays many airplanes and other military vehicles housed within several period hangers and other buildings. One of the more interesting exhibits is called the

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Airspace Exhibit where you can walk through the prototype Concord, and walk under a Vulcan bomber.

The Sunday found us at Silverstone, watching the Walter Hayes trophy races, which is a Formula Ford event that takes place on Silverstone's National circuit. The race weekend also included historic

open wheel racing, and a couple of British Racing, and Driver's Club races. I'm fortunate to have a good friend, Roger, who is a race marshal that provided us with free passes for the day. It was fun watching the action at Silverstone from some of the famous spots like Copse and Brooklands.

Monday morning was spent in Abingdon, touring the town and visiting Kimber house. Right next door to Kimber house is the former MG Car Co.'s administration building, which is now a block of flats.



Next, we were off to National Motor Museum in Beaulieu in the New Forest National Park. This museum was established by Lord Montagu and is situated on the Beaulieu estate, which includes the Montagu family's palace home and the ruins of the Beaulieu Abbey. The British Motor Museum (formally the Heritage Motor Centre) was next on the list. This museum recently underwent a multimillion \pounds expansion, which now allows visitors to see all the cars in their collection. The main museum building displays many cars in the collection, as well as historical items. The new building, the collection centre, displays the rest of the British Motor Industry Heritage Trust's collection as well as the cars in the Jaguar Heritage Trust, another

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450 cars in total. One car that I found interesting was the Austin Metro that was used as a mule for the MGF by placing a K-series engine in the back.

Thursday and Friday were spent at the Classic Motor Show. The show has 2500 classic cars and motorcycles, as well as Silverstone car auction, trade stands, club stands, live stages, and an autojumble, spanning one million square feet, which is about the same square footage as the North American Auto Show in Detroit. 71,000 people attended the three day event. One of the surprising interesting things I saw was an Envoy Custom with New Brunswick license plates and a Vauxhall Velox with Ontario license plates; both cars had recently been imported from their respective provinces.



Our last day in England, we were joined by my UK friend Roger, who picked us up and accompanied us to the Coventry Transport Museum, which houses a collection of vehicles (such as cycles, cars, buses), all manufactured in the Coventry area. One of

the nice things about this museum is that you start at the beginning of the cycle history and work your way through to the present car production, which today is Jaguar.

After doing the Coventry Transport Museum, we visited The Flying Standard for a pint and wondered what to do with the rest of the afternoon. Roger suggested the National Motorcycle Museum in Solihull, a museum neither John nor I had ever heard of. This museum houses the latest collection of British motorcycles; over 1000 with over 850 on display; what a massive collection. To be honest, it was overwhelming; four buildings filled handle bar grip to handle bar grip with fully restored motorcycles. This was a great way to end our visit to




England. Well, actually, the night at the pub playing darts was the great way to end our visit. Actually, the trip didn't end there. Monday morning Roger drove me back to Heathrow and on our way out of Birmingham; we stopped by MG Motor's Longbridge technical centre and showroom, where I got



to see firsthand the new MG GS, MG's first SUV. It seemed like a very well made, well-appointed car, and very well priced. Sad to think though, that no car is now assembled in Longbridge, but at least there are 200+ people employed at MG Motor's technical centre.





ARMSTRONG-SIDDELEY SAFFIRE 346 - 1954-60

This model had an all-new chassis, featuring coil spring suspension at the front and leaf springs at the rear. Power came from A 3.4 litre (210 cu in) six cylinder engine that was capable of 95 mph. Two gearboxes were offered. A four-speed synchromesh manual, or a Rolls-Royce supplied Hydramatic, power steering was an option. Less than 1500 were made and the financial loss suffered was severe enough to cause Armstrong-Siddeley to stop producing cars entirely in 1960. It was aimed at buyers of cars such as the Jaguar MK II. The Sapphire was to too slow and unwieldy to have mass appeal. It was an elegant and well appointed machine.

JAGUAR MK II - 1959-67

The Jaguar MK II was a big improvement over the MK I. It had a bigger glass area, better interior, slightly wider rear track, a different grill and all-around disc brakes as standard. It also had a much wider range of engines, including the famous 3.8 liter twin camshaft from the XK (production total 83,980) an all-synchromesh gearbox came in 1965. From 1967 the Mark II was available with optional power-assisted steering.

MORRIS SIX - 1948-54

In the late 1940's, a policy of standardization was introduced by the company, which included sharing body styles between Morris and Wolseley. The Wolseley 6/80 appeared in 1948, there was also a Morris Six look alike, with a less comfortable interior. A distinctive Morris grill and a detuned version of the Wolseley 2215 cc six-cylinder. The overhead camshaft unit was fitted just one carburetor (the Wolseley had two) The Morris Six sold poorly and ceased production in 1954, with 12,464 autos sold.

MORRIS MARINA - 1971-80

Two body versions were initially available, a saloon and a coupe. An Estate appeared in 1972. Power was from a 1275 cc A-series engine or a 1798 cc B-series engine. In 1978 the Marina was reworked inside and out, although it keep the same body shell. The 1275cc engine continued, but the 1798cc unit was replaced by a 1695cc overhead camshaft one. The Marina was replaced by the ITAL in 1980. Total production 953,576 units.
